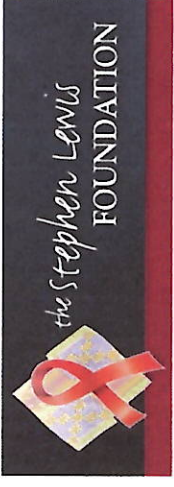

WomEnchant is a choir of women from a wide variety of backgrounds and musical experience. Our common thread is the desire to sing music that celebrates our lives, calls for peace and justice, and demonstrates the power of sisterhood and song. We welcome all women who want to learn and sing music that gives voice to our experiences and our commitment to making positive changes in the world. Since its beginning in 1994, WomEnchant has performed at many events centred around women's equality, including benefits for shelters, international Women's Day concerts, Take Back the Night rallies, and performances for women's centres and social service agencies. We have presented concerts featuring leading women performers including Lucie Blue Trembley, Faith Nolan, Betsy Tauro and sister Lune. In 2008, WomEnchant performed at the Seneca Falls celebrations for the 160th Anniversary of the first Women's Rights Convention. Our appearances also include services and events celebrating and supporting Earth Day and environmental concerns, as well as peace, anti-violence and global justice issues.

We often sing at fundraisers for a variety of important causes and are pleased to be a part of this year's World AIDS Awareness Day – Stephen Lewis Foundation fundraising evening.

In 2007, the WomEnchant drumming group was formed to give women the opportunity to learn about and perform on hand drums. Some of the drummers come from within the choir, while others belong only to the drummer's circle. The WomEnchant Drummers perform with the choir and on their own.

The Labyrinth

History

The labyrinth is an ancient symbol for the spiritual journey, which has been used by many cultures. The first one was found in Chartres Cathedral in France which had been constructed between 1194 – 1200 AD and was used for making spiritual pilgrimage or seeking guidance from God.

Meaning

The circular shape represents unity and wholeness. The single pathway into the centre and out again represents the path of life or the spiritual journey. The winding path represents times when we feel close to God, at peace with our life, and also times when we feel distance from God and our purpose seems unclear. The 3 stages of the walk are like the 3 stages of spiritual growth. The path in represents Purgation, letting go of old patterns that prevent growth. The centre represents Illumination, insight into our connection with the Divine and our life situation. The path out represents Union, integration of our insight into our life in the world.
